

### Accommodations:

We have reserved a number of rooms at the Ramada Inn Capitol Hill in downtown Hartford at 440 Asylum Street near Union Station, at a reduced rate of \$40.00 a room. You may fill out the enclosed "Advanced Registration Card" and mail it to the Ramada (Trinity is approximately 15 minutes from the Ramada.)

You may also book a single room at the Smith House on campus, for \$75.00 (single) or \$90.00 (twins or double); ring (203) 297-5241. This number can also be used to reach conference hosts and participants during the conference days.

Other downtown Hartford hotels include the Sheraton and the Holiday Inn.

It is possible to register for meals at the conference itself if unforeseen circumstances prevent advance booking.

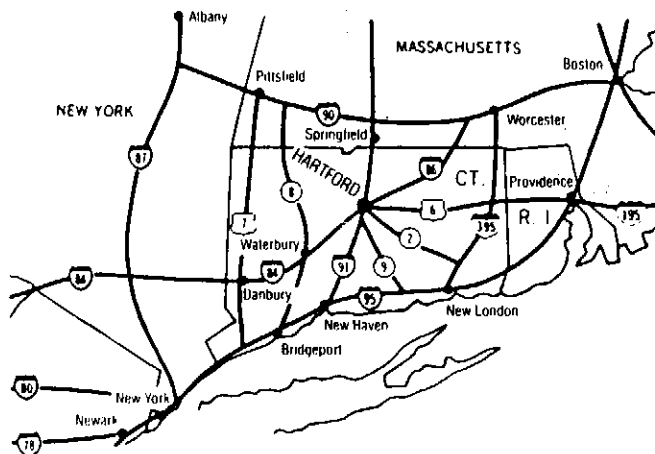
The following are directions to Trinity and to the Smith House:

**From the North** (Springfield, Bradley Airport) Take I-91 South to I-84, then follow instructions from the East.

**From the South** (New Haven, New York, etc.) Take I-91 North to intersection with I-84 West, then follow instructions from the East.

**From the East** (Boston, etc.) Take I-84 West to Sigourney St. Exit 47. Turn left at bottom of exit ramp, and, keeping to right side of roadway, proceed straight ahead. After short distance, merge with Park Terrace. Continue on Park Terrace through the traffic light at Park Street. Take the third (diagonal) left past the light onto Summit St. Go up hill one block to stop sign (at Zion St.) to the second stop sign (Vernon St.) You are now at the northwest corner of the Trinity campus. Turn left onto Vernon St. and the Smith House is on your right at 123 Vernon St. Parking is available directly opposite the Smith House.

**From the West** (NYC via I-84, Danbury, etc.) Take I-84 East to Capitol Ave. Exit 48B. At the foot of the exit ramp bear right onto Capitol Ave. At the fourth traffic light, turn left on Park Terrace. Proceed on Park Terrace through traffic lights at Russ St. and Park St. and take third (diagonal) left after Park St. onto Summit St. Go up hill one block to stop sign (At Zion St.) Cross Zion St. diagonally, proceeding up the hill (on Summit St.) to second sign at Vernon St. You are now at the northwest corner of the Trinity campus. Turn left onto Vernon St. and the Smith House is on your right at 123 Vernon St. Parking is available directly opposite the Smith House.
